In Ohio, public health accreditation is mandatory for all health departments in the state. Every local health department must be accreditation-ready by 2018 and fully nationally accredited by 2020. In June, we began this rigorous process which will take years of preparation, and the efforts of all health department staff. Becoming nationally accredited will allow us to measure our performance against a set of national standards, share and celebrate our successes, identify performance improvement opportunities, and develop the tools and methods we need to position us for success in the future.



screening and brief intervention tool in March with WIC prenatal This activity was implemented as a means for the Health Professionals to address the dangers of drinking alcohol during pregnancy and help participants set goals to reduce drinking or stop all together after the brief intervention and counseling is completed. This program was piloted in other states as well as in Montgomery County WIC and was found to have a positive impact on decreasing and/ or stopping alcohol consumption among the pregnant population.

Miami County WIC volunteered to participate in the Ohio Smoking Cessation Quality Improvement Project. This is a pilot program whose goal is to reduce the prevalence of smoking among pregnant and postpartum women. The pilot started in December and will run through June of 2015. The staff are utilizing the 5A's brief intervention counseling (ask, advise, assess, assist & arrange)

as a tool to achieve the outcome of decreasing smoking among our prenatal and postpartum patients. The CFHS and RHW programs with MCPH are also part of this project to make a greater impact in reducing smoking in our community.

The Miami County WIC program also received Masimo Pronto machines from State WIC as a new device to check participant's hemoglobin value. The new product is a nonevasive tool that utilizes a sensor placed on a finger to measure the total hemoglobin. The program has both pediatric and adult size sensors based on size of the finger. The Pronto device is not effective with children under the age of 2, clients with poor circulation or if nails have metallic polish on The program is them. completing finger sticks using a HemoCue machine to check the iron value in these cases.





The plumbing inspectors must be certified by the State of Ohio to perform inspections of businesses and private residences and must obtain required annual training. The sanitarians are public health inspectors who are registered by the State of Ohio. Sanitarians are required to have a baccalaureate degree in public health or the related sciences from an accredited college, have one to two years of on-theiob training as a sanitarian-in-training, pass a state exam as a prerequisite to becoming registered and obtain 18 hours of continuing education each year. When we are out working we are most readily identified as the person(s) carrying a clipboard and sprouting pens and

We license and inspect restaurants, groceries and carry-outs for the same reasons. We regulate swimming pools to prevent the spread of water borne disease, accidents, and drowning. We investigate hundreds of public health nuisance complaints throughout the county each year, perform an inspection of all schools twice a year for safety and sanitation, and investigate all reported animal bites to prevent the spread of rabies.

Want a tattoo, we license and inspect these establishments also. We make certain that the managers and artists have received training in first aid, safety, sanitation and the prevention of the transmission of infectious disease and blood borne pathogens. Building a house in the county, we are the agency you will contact to obtain a permit for your household sewage treatment system (septic system), private water system (well) and plumbing fixtures.

# $\mathbb{P}^{\text{UBLIC}}$ HEALTH NURSING is a specialized area of practice, which disease prevention and protection.

A major focus for 2014, that will continue every year moving forward, is Infant Mortality (IM). Infant mortality is defined as the death of a baby before his or her first birthday. Ohio's infant mortality rate is 7.7 (per 1,000 live births), which is higher than the United States combined. Miami County's rate is 4.9, which is higher than the state of California at 4.7. Causes of IM can be from; babies born too small or too early, maternal complications, birth defects, victims of injury, such as, suffocation from cosleeping, and Sudden Infant Death Syndrome. Education is being provided to the community on; The ABC's of Safe Sleep, How to be in the best of health before you get pregnant, and the harmful effects of smoking and drug and alcohol abuse. In 2014, we reached 520 families, 35 area churches, and 21 organizations.

In collaboration with the Miami County YMCA we have provided education on Nutrition & Activity to 203 2<sup>nd</sup> graders from 2 different schools and 36 kids from a Preschool.

Nursing collaborated with the Miami County Parks District. Trail Run Challenges, by obtaining height and weight to determine attendees Body Mass Index (BMI) and provided Blood Pressure screens.

Nursing collaborated with OSU Extension and YMCA for Nutrition & Activity education for our Reproductive Health/ Family Planning clients.

We will continue collaboration with Dayton Montgomery County Public Health to enhance our HIV Expanded Testing Initiative.

#### VACCINES

MCPH receives vaccines from the state and federal government for all children who are uninsured, on a Medicaid plan or have insurance that does not cover any cost for vaccines.

MCPH also is a recipient of the Immunization Action Plan grant (IAP). The goal of IAP is to get all children in Miami County up to date with immunizations by the time they are 24 months old. MCPH assesses immunization rates twice a year and identifies strategies to increase rates. The same assessment is available at private physician offices.

Any person travelling out of the US can make an appointment with one of our travel nurses. They will receive counseling on staying safe and healthy while traveling and any vaccines required or recommended for the countries they will visit. In 2014. 234 clients received 477 vaccines for travel.
